NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

“Neighbors Looking Out for Neighbors”

Neighborhood Watch helps restore the “front porch” to America. It brings residents into contact with each other for a common purpose, makes homes secure and streets safe. Neighborhood Watch is the most effective crime prevention tool ever developed. It creates a spirit of cooperation and communication between law enforcement officers and the people they serve.

Anyone in Collierville can participate in a local Neighborhood Watch program: homeowners, apartment dwellers, young people, senior citizens, etc. It is a commitment to know your neighbors, be alert to crime prevention and notify police of suspicious behavior - not to put yourself in danger. A watch group can be any size, has one or more coordinators, has a block captain for every small grouping of homes and a neighborhood directory for every participating resident.

Neighborhood Watch groups are developed and maintained by the Citizen Volunteer Program. An officer will help you put the program together and assist you with continuing programs such as personal safety, crime prevention, child safety, bike rodeos, National Night Out Against Crime, Operation Identification fire prevention and more.

Watch groups are headed by a resident who acts as a Coordinator and at least one Co-coordinator. Block Captains create and maintain the directory of residents.

KEEPING COLLIERVILLE SAFE

Collierville has a well-earned reputation for being a safe and friendly community. Our town is a growing community with a history of attracting new families seeking a secure and rewarding environment. The Collierville Police Department believes in and practices Community Policing; working with local businesses, organizations, churches and our citizens in crime prevention. By following some simple safety tips, we can be pro-active and avoid becoming victims of crimes of opportunity.

- Properly secure the doors and windows of your home.
- Properly secure your vehicle(s) at all times and in all locations.
- Keep valuables out of sight and secured.
- Be aware of your surroundings and immediately report all suspicious activity to the police by calling 853-3207 or 911 in instances you perceive to be an emergency.
- Be the eyes and ears of your police department. Relay these safety tips to your neighbors. Whether you are part of a Neighborhood Watch Program or not, this is a way to do the “neighborly thing” in our efforts to keep Collierville the safe and friendly community you have chosen for your home. The men and women of the Collierville Police Department are committed to working with our citizens to keep Collierville a safe place to live.

CRIME PREVENTION TIPS - HOME

General Tips:

- Make your home look occupied, and make it difficult to break in.
- Lock all outside doors and windows before you leave the house or go to bed. Even if it is for a short time, lock your doors.
- Leave lights on when you go out. If you are going to be away for a length of time, connect some lamps to automatic timers to turn them on in the evening and off during the day.
- Keep your garage door closed and locked.
- Don't allow daily deliveries of mail, newspapers or flyers build up while you are away. Arrange with the Post Office to hold your mail, or arrange for a friend or neighbor to take them regularly.
- Arrange for your lawn to be mowed if you are going away for an extended time.
- Check your locks on doors and windows and replace them with secure devices as necessary.
- Pushbutton locks on doorknobs are easy for burglars to open. Install deadbolt locks on all your outside doors.
- Sliding glass doors are vulnerable. Special locks are available for better security.
- Other windows may need better locks. Check with a locksmith or hardware store for alternatives.

Don't Tempt a Thief:

- Lawn mowers, barbecues and bicycles are best stored out of sight.
- Always lock your garden sheds and garages.
- Use curtains on garage and basement windows.
- Never leave notes on your door such as "Gone shopping."

Locks ... Get the Best:

- No lock, regardless of its quality, can be truly effective. Ask a locksmith for advice on your situation.
- Change locks immediately if your keys are lost or stolen.
- When moving into a new home, have all locks changed.

Targeting the Outside:

- Have adequate exterior lighting. A motion-sensitive light is recommended for backyards.
- Trim trees and shrubs so that they cannot be used as hiding places for intruders.
- Make sure your door hinges are on the inside.

Alarms:

- An alarm system is excellent for home security. It provides peace of mind to homeowners, especially while on vacation. There is a wide variety of alarm systems on the market.
- Make several inquiries to different companies for the best security system available to you.
- If you have a home alarm system, use it!
- Activate your alarm system - Alarm systems are only useful when you remember to activate them. But you also need to maintain it and train everyone in your household on its proper use to help prevent false alarms.

CRIME PREVENTION TIPS - SHOPPING

Driving

- Keep all car doors locked and windows closed while in or out of your car, set your alarm or use an anti-theft device.
- If you must shop at night, park in a well-lit area.
- Avoid parking next to vans, trucks with camper shells, or cars with tinted windows.
- Park as close as you can to your destination and take notice of where you parked.
- Never leave your car unoccupied with the motor running or with children inside.
- Do not leave packages or valuables on the seat of your car. This creates a temptation for thieves. If you must leave something in the car, lock it in the trunk or put it out of sight.
- Be sure to locate your keys prior to going to your car.
- Keep a secure hold on your purse, handbag and parcels. Do not put them down or on top of the car in order to open the door.
- When approaching or leaving your vehicle, be aware of your surroundings.
- Do not approach your car alone if there are suspicious people in the area.

- Ask mall or store security for an escort before leaving your shopping location if you are concerned.

Shopping

- Shop during daylight hours whenever possible. If you must shop at night, go with a friend or family member.
- Dress casually and comfortably.
- Avoid wearing expensive jewelry.
- Always carry your driver license or identification card along with necessary cash, checks and/or a credit card you expect to use.
- Even though you are rushed and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert to your surroundings.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- Pay for purchases with a check or credit card when possible.
- Keep cash in your front pocket.
- Notify the credit card issuer immediately if your credit card is lost, stolen or misused.
- Be extra careful if you do carry a wallet or purse. They are the prime targets of criminals in crowded shopping areas, transportation terminals, bus stops, on buses and other rapid transit.
- Avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion to avoid mishaps.
- Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason. At this time of year, “con-artists” may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings.

Automated Teller Machine (ATM)

- If you must use an ATM, choose one in a well-lit location. Withdraw only the amount of cash you need.
- Protect your PIN by shielding the ATM keypad from anyone who is standing near you.
- Do not throw your ATM receipt away at the ATM location.

Children

- If possible, leave small children at home with a trusted Babysitter.
- Teach your child to go to a store clerk and ask for help in case your child is separated from you.
- Teach children to stay close to you at all times while shopping.
- Never allow children to make unaccompanied trips to the restroom.
- Children should never be allowed to go to the car alone and they should never be left alone in the car.
- Teach children their full name, address and telephone number to give to police officers or mall security. Teach children to immediately inform you if a stranger is bothering them.

At Home

- Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave the house, even for a few minutes.
- When leaving home for an extended time, have a neighbor or family member watch your house and pick up your newspapers and mail.
- Indoor and outdoor lights should be on an automatic timer.
- Leave a radio or television on so the house looks and sounds occupied.
- Large displays of holiday gifts should not be visible through the windows and doors of your home.

CRIME PREVENTION TIPS – VEHICLE

Lock ALL your vehicle's doors.

Even if you plan to be gone for only a brief time, lock your doors. Every year, we have items stolen from unlocked vehicles where the owner was only going to be gone “just for a second”. It only takes seconds to steal your stuff! It's not at all uncommon for thieves to walk down a row of parked vehicles and check vehicle doors to see if they are unlocked. Don't leave any window open or even cracked open, including vent/wing windows and sunroofs.

Don't leave valuables in your car.

If you must leave valuable items in your car while out and about, place items out of sight before reaching your destination or move them inconspicuously.

Leave no trace.

Don't leave any “Sign” that there might be valuables “out of sight” in your vehicle, such as docking stations or connector cables. Leave nothing in “plain sight” that might make your vehicle worth “investigating” by a thief; not even loose coins or a CD.

Try to park in busy, well-lit and well-traveled areas.

Large anonymous lots are hit by thieves much more often than parking immediately adjacent to residential housing or other occupied buildings. Auto-burglars prefer breaking into cars where they will not be observed or attract notice, and choose their targets accordingly.

Set any alarm or anti-theft device.

If you have one, use it. Many people believe that car-alarms no longer make a difference, but they can be an effective deterrent to an auto-burglar, who most often chooses the easiest target. If they have two cars to choose from, one with an alarm and one without, they will likely burglarize the one without (unless you've left out valuables just too good to ignore!)

CERT: EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

The Shelby County Office of Preparedness offers **COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TRAINING** to the citizens of Shelby County. Following a major disaster, emergency services may not be able to meet the needs of the entire community for up to 72 hours. Most neighbors can be expected to volunteer assistance but may lack the knowledge and skills required to do the most good for the greatest number.

If a disaster overwhelms local response capability, CERT members can apply the training learned in the classroom and practical exercises to give critical support to their family, and neighbors in their immediate area, until help arrives.

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training is a free program designed to educate citizens about how to prepare for emergencies that might impact their area and trains them in basic disaster preparedness skills, such as fire suppression, light search and rescue, terrorism, and personal preparedness.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Domestic Violence is a pattern of behavior, the goal of which is to establish one partner as the person with the power and the control in the relationship. Abuse can manifest itself in the following four ways:

- Physical Abuse
- Sexual Abuse
- Emotional Abuse
- Financial Abuse

Almost 40% of all 911 calls in Shelby County involve domestic violence and arrests average about 10 a day. Nationally, over 95% of victims are women. In fact, domestic violence is the number one

health issue for women, exceeding rapes, muggings, and auto accidents combined. It accounts for 20% of all medical visits for women and 25% of emergency room visits.

In 80% of cases, children witness the abuse. In about a third of these cases, the children are also abused. Many of these children grow up to be victims or abusers.

Domestic violence has a huge impact not just on victims but also on the penal, legal and medical systems of our community. That's why the Collierville Police Department has created a special unit to address domestic violence. A primary objective is to provide the tools and information necessary to help victims escape abusive situations by prosecuting their abusers.

The Family Violence Council of Collierville (FVCC) is an outreach program for Domestic Violence crimes and educates the Collierville Community about Domestic Violence and available resources. The organization meetings are held the first Monday of every month at 6:00 pm at Collierville Town Library. Call 901-870-2990 for more information. This is the hotline number for the FVCC and available 24 hours a day. FVCC is a non-profit organization.

COLLIERVILLE POLICE WEB SITE

All citizens can connect the Collierville Police web site by entering www.colliervillepolice.org. Crime Map

This is a current crime map. See the location and type of crimes recently reported in our Town. This information is updated frequently and includes all crimes that can be publically reported without jeopardizing ongoing investigations.

Forms

Includes those for vacation checks, National Night Out registration, alarm registration, physical impairment notice and narcotics complaint form. Of special note is the Traffic Enforcement request form to be used when you wish the CPD to respond to a specific traffic problem in your area.

Tip 411

A link is in place for you to register for this alert service. It will provide you with community alerts via whichever electronic means you request. This is also available for you to provide the Collierville Police with anonymous tips (if you wish), which helps citizens take part in reducing crime in our town.

CITIZEN'S POLICE ACADEMY

Get a personal, hands-on demonstration of how police officers handle a wide variety of routine and nonroutine duties.

The first class of the Collierville Citizen's Police Academy started in 2000 as a way to inform citizens how police officers operate and the intricacies of the job. Instead of relying solely on classroom lectures, the officers give students a hands-on feel of the process by role-playing situations.

The Academy meets one night a week for 10 weeks and covers:

- Constitutional/Criminal Law / Criminal Investigations
- SWAT Unit
- DUI Investigation
- Defensive Tactics/Use of Force
- Jail/Communications Center Tour, K-9 Unit
- Traffic Stops
- Crisis Intervention

Applicants must meet the following requirements:

- At least 16 yrs old
- No felony convictions
- Pass a background check
- No misdemeanor arrests within 5 years
- Live or work in Collierville
- No pending criminal charges
- Complete application
- Sign waiver agreements

CITIZEN VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

The Citizen Volunteer Program (CVP) was established to serve as a resource to the Collierville Police Department. CVP members perform non-enforcement, service-oriented duties, releasing the commissioned officers to perform duties that require the experience of sworn personnel.

Some of the activities/programs the CVP handle are: developing and supporting Neighborhood Watch, residential vacation checks, shut-in visitations, delivering newcomer information guides, traffic direction, support at community special events, coordination of National Night Out Against Crime, and equipment transport.

Although CVP members are not sworn police officers, there are qualifications and background checks that must be met:

- Members must be in good physical health with good vision. Must possess a valid driver's license
- Must have a good driving record.
- Must be of good character with no convictions of a felony or serious misdemeanor crime involving moral turpitude.
- Must be of unquestionable character.
- All members are expected to be available weekdays and weekends.
- All members are expected to volunteer at least 16 hours per month.

Candidates receive training, which involves a general overview of the Collierville Police Department, radio procedures, traffic control, communications, patrol and administrative functions, and public relations.

CRIME STOPPERS

Your information may help to resolve a crime and may mean cash reward up to \$1000 for you. Crime Stoppers rewards anonymous callers for crime tips to its 24-hour hotline. Calls to our hotline are not recorded or monitored and the caller cannot be identified.

POLICE RESERVE OFFICER PROGRAM

LAW ENFORCEMENT EXPLORER PROGRAM

This program is a Young Adult Division of Boy Scouts of America. The Collierville Police Department Explorer Post is a volunteer organization for promising young people, age 14 to 20, who are interested in exploring law enforcement as a career. Today, there are more than 33,000 young men and women participating in Law Enforcement Explorer Programs in over 1,500 Law Enforcement Posts organized by local agencies. As a Collierville Police Explorer, you will have the opportunity to work with different divisions of the police department, and visit other law enforcement agencies and criminal justice systems. This opportunity to work with the Collierville Police Department will give members first hand insight into a potential career in law enforcement.
